

Six Year Graduation Rates

The six-year graduation rate shows the percentage of students who began their studies as full-time, first-time, bachelor's degree-seeking students in fall of a given year who earned the degree within 150% of "normal time".

First-to-Second Year Retention Rates

The retention rate measures the percentage of full-time, first-time bachelor's degree-seeking students who enter in a given fall semester and return to the institution to continue their studies the following fall.
